


Trust begins with letting go

*What if anti-trafficking didn't need to be heroic?
What if it just needed to be local, consistent, and quietly brave?"*

In the hills of northern Thailand, near the Myanmar border, The Freedom Story (TFS) has been quietly sowing the seeds of trafficking prevention for over a decade.

No dramatic rescues. No front-page stories. Just deep, steady care – **community by community, child by child.**

When we first met Lucy and the TFS team in 2021, it was the height of COVID. Many organizations were barely holding on but TFS stood out – not just for their resilience, but the emotional weight of their mission. They weren't just preventing exploitation; they were creating opportunities and rebuilding dignity for vulnerable families.

Our first milestone together was setting up a relief grant. A modest, practical step – but it paved the way for something more.

Together, we leaned into a different idea of growth: what if scaling didn't mean expanding – but sharing?

Over the next three years, we supported TFS to distill their model – education access, mentorship, family support, and community training – into something that other grassroots groups could adapt in their own ways and time.

By sharing the love, our work wasn't a product; it was a process – **full of vulnerability, learning, and unexpected joy.**





The Love that Held it together

Our combined efforts only worked because of trust. Trust in local leadership. Trust in the community. We had faith that others would carry it forward, and our belief bore fruit.

"When our early partners started recommending others to join the project, that's when we knew. They weren't just using the model. They believed in it." - Lucy

In 2024, a group of youth in Chiang Rai created a series of short films about online scamming. The videos were raw, funny, and startlingly honest – sparking conversations across schools, churches, and homes. The impact wasn't just about awareness, it was about building a sense of ownership and inspiring the community to tackle the issues too.

The Lesson of the Heart

TFS didn't grow bigger. They grew wider - by letting others lead.

"We weren't chasing a perfect model. We were creating space for communities to lead in their own way - and to remind us what prevention looks like when it's rooted in care." - Lucy

This chapter of our collaboration may have ended but the work continues in the next phase where we leverage on this growth to take the network beyond borders.



Love is all about timing

"Real partnership means making space, keeping pace, and showing up - especially when it's hard."

Most partnerships start with a yes. Ours began with a no.

When we first approached Turning Tables Denmark (TTDK) to offer funding support, they declined. Their reason? The timing wasn't right.

Back then, TTDK was in the middle of something big. They had just secured permission to convert a disused chapel into a youth-led cultural lab. It was a hard-won achievement, but also a massive project that stretched their bandwidth to the limit.

"We were growing fast. But our internal scaffolding needed to keep up. We needed a pause before we could say yes."

So we paused too and in a world of busy schedules and fast deadlines, we chose to wait. Then we restarted the conversation at just the right time, with one clear desire: **to understand them.**

TTDK was evolving from a small, project-based team to a medium-sized organization with a bold, long-term vision. But transitions like this are never easy. The challenges were clear: scaling responsibly, stabilizing their team, securing financial sustainability, and putting systems in place to support it all.

The turning point came when we used our in-house 360° tool with TTDK for a full organizational review.

"It took a lot of time. And wasn't easy. But it helped us define who we were - and where we needed to grow. We still use the framework to track our progress till today." - Martin

Together, we mapped five shared outcomes:

- 01 Secure long-term financial health
- 02 Strengthen governance and decision-making processes
- 03 Improve internal systems, especially in HR and workflow
- 04 Build knowledge collection, impact management, and program methodology
- 05 Develop communications to amplify the work

We didn't want our grant to be a traditional type, supporting only short-term goals. For us, it was about creating space for TTDK to reflect, experiment, and sustain themselves for the long run.

With core funding in place, TTDK was able to hire for three pivotal roles: business development, HR, and production. They also invested in leadership and social work development across the team.

the Love that held it together

In this partnership, we didn't want to lead. We wanted to walk alongside TTDK in the spirit of collaboration.

To do that, **we needed to show up** – not just at strategy calls, but in the everyday. So, our Denmark-based teammate, Alex, began spending two days a week at TTDK – painting chapel walls, joining meetings, and helping out with daily tasks.



"At first, the idea felt unusual. But over time, we saw how valuable it was. Having Alex around became a natural part of our rhythm – and honestly, it made 'reporting' feel less formal, because he already knew our everyday. The team never saw him as 'ECCA.' He was just Alex." – Martin

The journey wasn't smooth. Renovations of the chapel and two cultural labs were delayed, along with several milestones in our planning. But our close working relationship allowed us to adapt fast.

To support this, we also set up a quarterly steering group together with another co-funder, Bikubenfonden. This wasn't just for governance, it was part of a shared experiment to explore how funders can collaborate better and make things easier for partners.

It was a deliberate effort to challenge traditional funder-grantee dynamics and reimagine what collaborative, trust-based funding could look like.

Where it's gone

Since then, TTDK has grown into one of the country's most dynamic youth arts organizations, running three youth-led cultural labs in social housing communities. All labs are guided by professional creative mentors trained in social work, giving youth a unique blend of arts education and relational care.

Each lab is part studio, part living room, part community space. Young people gather there to create, hang out, make music, direct films, host events – or just be. They grew in popularity as a third space for the youth, and flourished into ecosystems of belonging. In 2024 alone, **391 youths visited and worked regularly in the labs. 35 of them were hired** as assistant instructors, photographers, and production crew for events.

the Lesson of the Heart

This was never just about funding a program. It was about investing in an organization's ability to grow – on their own terms.

They say love is patient and seeks to understand, and this collaboration taught us exactly that – the value of giving space and **waiting for the right time.**

The experience has been a truly transformative one for us, as we learnt to approach funding in a whole new light. And it all started with a "no."





Regeneration as a love language

"Regeneration isn't just about the land - it's about what happens to the people who tend it."

In the quiet valleys of Pai, regeneration began not as a grand initiative – but as a humble invitation.

Damien, a former chef, left city life behind together with his partner Lyse and their two children in search of something more grounded. On a modest patch of land, they began experimenting with regenerative farming. But it was about **more than just soil**. It was about the people.

Sarah, a local Karen farmer, was one of the first to reach out. Her father had spent years in chemical farming, and when he passed, the land he left behind was tired, toxic, and barren. Desperate for another way, Sarah approached Damien and asked him to visit her village, Muang Noi.

It was the moment we realized regeneration may be a lofty idea for some, but a matter of survival for others.



the Courtship

For nearly a year, we simply listened – supporting outreach and collaboration with farmers, neighbors, and elders. Most regenerative initiatives we had studied in this region met with limited success – not for lack of knowledge, but because they focused only on techniques and not on trust. With this in mind, we shaped a deeper approach:

- 01 Hands-on, practical training rooted in traditional knowledge
- 02 Shared infrastructure and direct access to buyers
- 03 Monthly income support during the fragile early transition stage

ECOA's Thoughts

"Yes, it was expensive. And yes, harder to scale. But this pilot had to prove two things: that the soil could recover, and that trust could be rebuilt." - Carol

By early 2023, 17 families had joined. What started as a personal experiment was evolving into a **community-led cooperative**.

One of the boldest steps taken by Damien and Lyse's team was to help farmers renegotiate existing debts. They helped assure banks that if the farmers stayed on the course, the project would help repay what was owed. A win for the farmers, the banks, and the land.



The Love that Held it together

We worked with Damien's team to design a model that could withstand the winds of change. That commitment was tested in 2024, when the community was hit by a series of harsh, uncontrollable climate events.

First came an unusually dry season, where water was scarce, and crops struggled to take root. Then flash floods swept through the valleys, washing away precious topsoil and young plants. Just when things seemed to stabilize, a rat infestation destroyed nearly 90% of what remained.

For a community just beginning to trust nature again, it was a devastating season. Yet, farmers leaned on and cared for each other in a show of strength that spoke volumes about their love for the land.

Where it's gone

Today, all 14 farms in Muang Noi have transitioned from monoculture to biodiverse farming. For the first time in recent memory, no new debt has been added – a remarkable feat in this chemically dependent region.

Through *BeLeaf*, the community now produces organic pastes, jams, and other goods. Homestays, weaving, sword dancing, and ecotourism are also slowly generating additional income and restoring cultural pride through this project which has been drawing attention from even local government officials.

Who knew something as soft as soil could lead to such rock solid impact? Together, we've put down roots to grow something far deeper: a movement of people reclaiming their futures together.

The journey is still slow and seasonal but the foundation of the change is firm and lasting.

It started with a question: What if we could help people find not just jobs, but purpose?

In 2016, a group of passionate changemakers came together with a shared belief – that underserved communities deserve more than charity. They **deserve real opportunities** to live with independence, dignity, and direction.

So they built Trampoline: a social innovation enterprise designed to connect overlooked talent with meaningful work.



The journey took them to unexpected places of discovery – especially among neurodiverse individuals and people with disabilities. Through one-on-one assessments, the team began to uncover not just skills, but the **unique ways each person learns, thinks, and thrives.**

They saw what others didn't: with the right support, someone once labelled "unemployable" could become a forklift-certified warehouse wizard. (Shout out to Gareth, who proved that neurodiverse individuals are more than capable of handling heavy machinery – and stereotypes).

The Love that held it together

In 2019, Trampoline launched pilot programs that confirmed something powerful: many on the autism spectrum thrive in roles that require structure, focus, and precision – like engineering and data work.

By 2022, they launched **GATES – Growing Alternate Talent for the Engineering Sector** – a program designed not just to place people in jobs, but to build long-term success. Instead of focusing just on the trainees, it brought families, employers, and coaches into the process – creating an ecosystem of support from recruitment to retention.

Trampoline's support extends beyond the office. Their weekly **Valor Programme** offers exercise sessions, group hikes, and social games – keeping trainees connected, confident, and active.

Where it's gone

Today, **over 70 people have found work** through GATES. A third of them are still thriving in their roles beyond nine months – some have even earned raises or taken on bigger responsibilities. Our participants, You Kai Xuan and See Chun Shan, have continued to grow with the help of long-term coaching.

In 2024, Trampoline asked another question: What if we didn't wait until adulthood to start? 

The answer is Undifferent – a **co-living and learning pilot centre** for youth with different learning needs. A soft place to land. A strong place to grow. We're proud to keep walking alongside Trampoline in this next chapter, as we work together to break down more barriers to belonging, learning, and meaningful work.

The Lesson of the Heart

What began as a pilot is now a proof point: hiring inclusively brings the **same return on investment** as any other hires. For employers unsure where to begin, internships and job trials are a good starting point. The onboarding might take a little more time, but the value of long-term consistency, loyalty, and performance is immeasurable.

Because when we see people not as problems to fix, but as talents to discover, it's matchmaking with a meaningful twist.

Some partnerships start with a pitch deck. This one started with a coffee on Carol's first day at ECCA.

Tom and Ben, the founders of Seven Clean Seas (SCS), had a simple ask: a small grant to help them hire a third teammate. But what they offered in return was far greater: a vision fueled by love. Love for the oceans. And a stubborn belief that systems could be built differently and fairly.

"They spoke with such passion and urgency that you couldn't help but believe in them - even when it was just two people and a dream." - Carol

At the time, SCS was transitioning from beach cleanups to something bolder: upstream recovery, waste accountability, and scalable solutions to stop plastic at its source. They weren't just picking up trash; they were rewriting the rules.

The journey was far from linear. It veered sideways and even went off track sometimes, but that's how some of the greatest love stories go.

ECCA's first grant was for capacity-building. Nothing flashy but we'd look back and see this as the catalyst for everything. It gave SCS space to stabilize, hire, and professionalize.

"We've been on a journey of professionalization with ECCA that really set us up for success."

Then came the roadblocks. When plans to launch the HIPPO, a solar-powered river-cleaning vessel, in Vietnam hit regulatory red tape, SCS had a choice: pause or pivot.

Together, we found a third option - Thailand. ECCA funded a feasibility study to test HIPPO's deployment in Bangkok's Chao Phraya River. Progress was slow, but in 2024, a breakthrough came: HIPPO was officially launched, and an MoU was signed with the Department of Marine and Coastal Resources.

ECCA's Thoughts

"After years of persistence, the HIPPO finally hit the waves - a testament to what love and patience can build."

We backed the next phase with a third grant to support R&D that would turn recovered plastic waste into something of value. **Circularity was a priority** from day one. That same waste is now being transformed into coasters, certified bricks, and roof plates that replace toxic asbestos.

The Love that Held it together

In the face of setbacks, hard decisions, and growing pains, we made sure to maintain a foundation of trust.

"We learned a lot along the way - firing our first team members, saying no to an unfair equity offer, navigating red tape just to launch a vessel. Through it all, ECCA became someone we could talk to, rant with - even when the answers weren't always clear."

By 2022, this trust deepened. ECCA made its first-ever impact-first equity investment in SCS. It wasn't because the model was perfect, it was a show of our faith in the relentlessly driven people behind the model.

"This was never just a project. It was about not giving up on building systems. From beach cleanups to a financially viable model for waste recovery, to circular economy solutions and local job creation - SCS is changing the game. Not just by removing waste, but by restoring value to both people and nature." - Carol



"I consider Carol a friend and a dependable point of contact. We can speak openly - about opportunities, hard choices, the sectors. Honestly, I don't see how this relationship could be stronger than it already is." - Tom

Today, SCS has grown from two co-founders into a team of over 100, operating certified ocean plastic recovery programs in Singapore, Indonesia, and Thailand. Their milestones in 2024 alone speak for themselves:

2000+ Metric tons of plastic recovered (over 5,000+ metric tons in total)	1 HIPPO Unit deployed in the Chao Phraya River
100+ Formal jobs created with fair wages, benefits & safe working conditions	60% reduction of single-use plastic in pilot schools
1,800+ Roof plates were made from hard-to-recycle plastic	2000+ Coasters produced from bottle caps

Critically, every SCS project is now independently verified under Control Union, OBP Neutrality, and Verra's Plastic Waste Reduction Standard - ensuring traceability, credibility, and true impact.

SCS isn't just a cleanup organization. It's a systems builder, innovating solutions that turn waste into bricks, furniture, and hope - proving that new life can be restored from even discarded materials.

The Lesson of the Heart



Sometimes, love takes a leap of faith. You don't always have the answers and sometimes, our partners aren't always able to provide every last bit of information.

But we don't need all the answers. We need people worth believing in - and the patience to grow with them.

Seven Clean Seas isn't done. They're still pushing boundaries, still crafting solutions that didn't exist before. And we're proud to keep walking beside them, and believing in what they dream up next.


Fishesfolk defending the seas that they harvest

AI-powered recycling stations that turn waste into rewards for Thai suburbs. Villages earn points for recycling – redeemable at local shops – while building a live map of plastic waste. Our impact loan helped scale their first contracts.

Turning recycling into a daily habit isn't just good for the planet – it also creates **visible, trackable value for communities.**

“Can policy work hand in hand with science to rescue and restore corals?”

Supporting ATMEC and their partners to develop Thailand's **first hydrodynamic reef** map, where spawning cycles are used to revolutionize restoration. They are on track to proving that biodiversity thrives through evidence-based conservation efforts.

Good science, when locally driven and grounded in evidence, can reshape how we restore entire marine ecosystems.

What began as a COVID-era relief partnership evolved into sustained support for field research, reef monitoring, and capacity development for early-career Thai marine scientists.

Our backing helped COREsea deepen their collaboration with Thailand’s Department of Marine and Coastal Resources when their MOU was successfully renewed in 2024. A **new conservation site** – Ang Thong National Park – was also included.

Why it matters:

The results of conservation don’t always appear grand; sometimes, it’s measured simply in the presence of clams and coral – and in the quiet commitment of those who return to the reef every single day.

A movement born from one jerry-rigged machine

“Plastic waste should build communities, not landfills.”

When we met Precious Plastic Bangkok in 2021, they had a bold vision: to turn plastic waste into a community resource – empowering locals to create, earn, and lead the shift toward zero waste.

In just three years, **11 community hubs** have **recycled 23.6 metric tons** of plastic waste, generating US\$40,662 in supplemental income for over 280 locals. Our next step? Publishing open-source DIY blueprints to help anyone, start their own circular initiative anywhere.

Why it matters:

Because mothers, neighbors, and everyday people make the best changemakers, when given the tools.

“Ecosystems can heal when people thrive.”

In 2020, we joined forces with the World Wide Fund for Nature to support the Forest Landscape Restoration Fund (FLR349) in Thailand. Our goal was to **revitalize the land in Mae Chaem** through agroecology, strengthening food security, and giving farmers the tools to heal the land while making it work for them.

By 2024, the project led to the restoration of 25.7 hectares of watershed in Mae Chaem, achieved by planting 9,860 saplings. These efforts have improved soil fertility, increased water retention, and enhanced biodiversity, creating a resilient ecosystem that benefits both the environment and local communities. Farmers are actively involved in monitoring the growth of these saplings, ensuring the long-term success of the restoration efforts.

Why it matters

Because ecosystems thrive when communities are empowered to lead and sustain them.

Transforming spaces, one emotion at a time

“What if workplaces – and schools – ran on empathy?”

In 2021, the Bettr Fellowship was launched to help social enterprises create more inclusive and emotionally intelligent workplaces. Using the Six Seconds model of Emotional Intelligence, Bettr Lives – Six Seconds’ certified partner in Singapore – equips leaders and middle managers with personalized emotional development plans, peer learning circles, mentorship, and leadership coaching. The program also draws on Bettr Group’s real-world experiences working with at-risk youths and single mothers, making the learning both grounded and practical.

11 organizations have since completed the fellowship over two successful cycles, but we realized empathy shouldn’t be limited to the workplace. In 2024, they launched NEMO (Navigating Emotions), a new program bringing emotional intelligence into schools. With our support, they’re now expanding into more classrooms – and equipping teachers too – to help both students and educators build emotional resilience and lead with heart.

Since 2020, we’ve supported 17 scholars from seven countries through scholarship to study at Danish School of Media and Journalism (DMJX).



Walaa Ibrahim (Sudan) continued her education at the prestigious International Center of Photography in New York, building on the foundation she developed at DMJX.



Zohreh Sadati (Iran) is building her career in Paris through art and photography, actively exhibiting her work and having published a personal photobook.



Hana Gamal (Egypt) has had her work featured in The New York Times, Huck Magazine, and The Huffington Post. She has exhibited internationally, including in France, Egypt, Australia, and Germany.



Mohammed Mahdy (Egypt) received a World Press Photo Award and is also an educator. His ongoing project titled ‘Here, the Doors Don’t Know Me’ has been widely published and exhibited.






